2009 Health Disparity Fact Sheet African Americans/Blacks in Colorado



This fact sheet provides information about some of the major health indicators for the African American/Black population in Colorado. Like other communities of color, African Americans/Blacks experience some differences in health, risk factors and behaviors in comparison to other population groups. The data presented show comparisons between the African American/Black population and the State's population as a whole and identifies where there are differences. The disparity column shows if the African American/Black rate is statistically worse (red), better (green) or the same (white) as the state rate. If it is the same, that means there is no statistically significant difference.

There are roughly 214,000 African Americans/Blacks in Colorado, which is almost five percent of the State's population. (2007 data, State Demography Office, Colorado Department of Local Affairs)

- The median household income for African Americans/Blacks is \$17,452 less than the state median.
- Almost twice as many African Americans/Blacks are living below the poverty level than the overall state population.
- Fewer African Americans/Blacks graduate from high school than the state's population as a whole.

- Infant death and low weight births are much higher than the population as a whole.
- More than half of all African American/Black births are from unplanned pregnancies.
- The teen birth rate is essentially the same as the state rate and has decreased substantially over the last 15 years.
- African American/Blacks report more stress, but about the same amount of drinking and smoking during pregnancy.
- African American/Black children are somewhat more likely to be obese (not statistically significant).

African Americans/Blacks are more likely to exhibit many risk behaviors than the State's population as a whole. They are:

- Less likely to engage in binge drinking.
- Less likely to eat five or more fruits and vegetables a day, and more likely to be overweight or obese.
- Just as likely to participate in some kind of physical activity as all Coloradans.
- More likely to experience more than one week a month of poor mental health in the last month.

- African American/Black women are just as likely to have had a mammogram or pap test as all Colorado women.
- More African American/Blacks have been told by a doctor that they have high blood pressure.
- More have been diagnosed with diabetes than the State's population as a whole.

• African Americans/Blacks have a higher rate of new cases of infectious diseases than the state population. Their rates for gonorrhea and HIV/AIDS are the highest rates of any racial/ethnic group.

• The top two leading causes of death, cancer and heart disease, are the same for African Americans/Blacks as they are for the State's population as a whole. Diabetes is ranked sixth for African Americans/Blacks, but 8th for the State. Kidney disease is in the top 10 causes of death for African American/Blacks, but not for the state as a whole. Suicide is one of the state's top 10 causes of death, but is not for the African American/Black population.
